### All Saint's Day

On November 1 we remember the saints and allow the memory of their faith to spur us on to deeper worship and greater service to the Lord. All Saints Day, also known as All Hallows' Day, or Hallowmas, is a Christian celebration in honor of all the saints from Christian history.

In the early years when the Roman Empire persecuted Christians, so many martyrs died for their faith, that the Church set aside special days to honor them. But then with too many martyrs to each be given a day, they were grouped together into one day. Pope Gregory III changed the date of All Saints Day to Nov 1 and people prepared for their celebration with a night of vigil on Hallows' Eve.

This day reminds us of our connectedness as Christians. Perhaps, you were taught to think of saints as statues in a church building. But the Bible teaches something completely different. Who is a saint? You are. That is if you're a follower of Jesus. God calls a "saint" anyone who trusts in Christ alone for salvation (see Acts 9:13, Acts 26:10, Romans 8:27, 1 Corinthians 1:2).

Sainthood isn't given by a group of religious leaders. It's

granted by God Himself to any common, salt-of-the-earth person who simply trusts Christ (1 Corinthians 1:2). Saints are those who give up the antifaith alternative of trying to please God by their good deeds and, instead, trust Christ alone.

### **Celebrating All Saints Day**

The 1662 Book of Common Prayer says that the holiday stands for "the unity of Christians of all ages, countries, and races in Christ, and the perfection of that unity in heaven."

The Bible doesn't tell us to pray to the saints (Matt. 6:6) or through the saints (1 Tim. 2:5). Instead, we think of our connectedness to past saints and find inspiration in their stories of God's faithfulness. These saints speak from the past and are whispering at this moment... "God is faithful."

While traditions across the globe vary, the common theme is celebration with family and remembrance of those who have passed. Many visit grave sites of loved ones to pay tribute and remember those who have passed onto heaven (sometimes with feasts of the deceased favorite foods). In Italy, All Saints Day bread is baked and shared among loved ones. And of course don't

- Matthew 9:37-38



# Report from SC Regional Gathering

On Sunday October 2, George and Barbara Coulombe, Susan Shultz and Fr. Andrew Osmun attended a gathering of South Central Regional parishes without clergy. The meeting was to provide a forum to share ideas of how to maintain an active community of faith in the absence of clergy leadership and share areas of friction with Rachel Thomas (our SC Regional Missionary).

While there were only four parishes represented, many good ideas were discussed. The conversation grew quite lively when we got into the areas of friction.

All agreed that the biggest difficulty is with finding and scheduling supply clergy. Rachel has a number of ideas she is going to bring back to ECCT to try to improve this process.

There was also a desire to have better communication of events between parishes. Various possibilities are going to be pursued. Overall C&E is doing as well (if not in some areas better) than other parishes in a similar position.

### Saint Spotlight - St. Francis of Assisi

Saint Francis of Assisi abandoned a life of luxury for a life devoted to Christianity after hearing the voice of God, who commanded him to rebuild the Christian church and live in poverty. He is the patron saint for ecologists.

Born in Italy circa 1181, Saint Francis of Assisi was renowned for drinking and partying in his youth. After fighting in a battle between Assisi and Perugia, Francis was captured and imprisoned for ransom. He spent nearly a year in prison, and began receiving visions from God. After his release from prison, Francis heard the voice of Christ, who



told him to repair the Christian Church and live a life of poverty. Consequently, he abandoned his life of luxury and became a devotee of the faith, his reputation spreading all over the Christian world.

Francis' embrace of Christ-like poverty was a radical notion at the time. The Christian church was tremendously rich, much like the people heading it, which concerned Francis and many others, who felt that the long-held apostolic ideals had eroded. Francis set out on a mission to restore Jesus Christ's own, original values to the now-decadent church. With his incredible charisma, he drew thousands of followers to him. They listened to Francis' sermons and joined in his way of life; his followers became known as Franciscan friars.

Continuously pushing himself in the quest for spiritual perfection, Francis was soon preaching in up to five villages per day, teaching a new kind of emotional and personal Christian religion that everyday people could understand. He even went so far as to preach to animals, which garnered criticism from some and earned him the nickname "God's fool." But Francis' message was spread far and wide, and thousands of people were captivated by what they heard.

Later in life, Francis reportedly received a vision that left him with the stigmata of Christ — marks resembling the wounds Jesus Christ suffered when he was crucified — making Francis the first person to receive such holy wounds. He was canonized as a saint on July 16, 1228. During his life he also developed a deep love of nature and animals and is known as the patron saint of the environment and animals; his life and words have had a lasting resonance with millions of followers across the globe. Each October, many animals the world over are blessed on his feast day.

Notes: Income is under budget primarily due to some timing issues. However Junk in the Trunk has not brought in the revenue we had budgeted for. As mentioned before with unexpected furnace repairs and the other incremental increases, our YTD expenses are now almost \$10,000 higher than budgeted while income is only about \$500 over budget. We had budgeted a surplus of \$9,000 so that has pretty much been eaten up. And this is with relying on some large ((\$8,000) end of the year special gifts. We will need to be vigilant to do what we can to trim costs and increase income (keeping supply clergy to twice a month helps) in order to be close to a balanced budget – especially knowing we still have some more furnace work coming.
